Our family has taken many trips together and tours are a frequent activity from the natural attractions, manmade attractions, and cultural entities. We remember the special tours that made us laugh (Wisconsin Ducks),

As a tour guide, I translate facts into meaning, such as teach about the limelight, entertain with stories about Corning's Milo Green and Warren Lee, and transform the information into a memorable experience whether it be touching the First National Bank's teller window or taking pictures in comical hats.



With any tour I lead, the first question is, are you interested in history, architecture, or the arts. That will personalize the points of interest I share with you or your group. In June, Imagine the Possibilities brought a group for a specialized tour since they are unable to do steps so we played a drama game, "painted" the ceiling, and took a picture. Another group consisted of retired teachers who were very interested in history and how our hands-on school tours teach about the lightboard and microphones. Another group was into architecture and enjoyed learning about the raked floor and Shakespeare door. During the month of June alone, I gave 11 tours, some planned and some just drop-in.

A memorable tour I gave was to four sisters who each live in a different state: Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska, and lowa. They pick a location and spend a weekend together. The organizer for this day planned time at Lake Icaria, shopping on our Main Street and an hour tour of the Corning Opera House. Unknown to her siblings, she had prepared a video of their lives together from birth to the current day. So, after the tour, I encouraged them to set in the cool and "left" them, but in reality, I started the video. For the next couple of hours, they cried and laughed together as they remembered their parents who had passed on, shared clothes as teenagers, and being there for each other's families at the birth of their children. A truly memorable tour!

I believe life is meant to be experienced, live it, and taste it! Some of my favorite memories are ones I stumbled upon while I was looking for something else. Come explore and let's weave some beautiful stories together!
